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Westview Hills Bands -- Ensembles and Structure

Cadet Band -- 6th Grade Band Students

Cadet Band is a large ensemble band for 6th grade students. It meets during 6th grade WIN-period every day and is taught by Mrs. Moffett & Mr. Huff.

Blue Band & Gold Band -- 7th & 8th Grade Students

All 7th & 8th grade students have their large ensemble band during 7th/8th grade WIN-period every day. These students are divided into two bands, the "Blue Band," which is taught by Mr. Huff and the "Gold Band," which is taught by Mrs. Moffett. Due to the Covid Pandemic students in these two grade levels have been playing their instruments for the same number of years. For this reason this year's Gold Band and Blue Band are both learning the 3rd-year band curriculum with the Blue Band as a regular 3rd-year band class and the Gold Band as an advanced 3rd-year band class. Next year the bands will return to grade-level based bands.

Small-Group Lessons

All band students have one small-group lesson per-week.

Westview Hills Band Grading

Students in band will receive grades for band that are factored into honor roll and overall GPA. Students will be graded on the following criteria every quarter:

- Participation in rehearsals and small group lessons
- Performance aptitude on band music
- Playing Assessments (i.e. scale tests, rhythm tests, etc.)
- Other Written Assignments

RESPECT

- One person talks at a time
- Stop at the cut-off!

RESPONSIBILITY

- Always be prepared (instrument, music, etc)
- PENCILS ON STANDS
- Treat equipment/facility/instruments respectfully (NO GUM!)
- ALL instruments home to practice (at least on the weekends at the very least!) -- PRACTICE!

SAFETY

- Help keep the band room organized (no cases or music on the floor)
- Be careful not to leave your instrument on the floor or anyplace else where damage could occur!
- No running, jumping, climbing, throwing
- Keep your instrument case labeled we will provide you with a luggage tag if you need one

Pull-Out Lesson Guidelines

- 1. Lessons are part of students' band grade. Students are expected to attend one lesson per-week.
- 2. Missed lessons are excused for the following reasons:
 - a. Absence from school
 - b. You have below a "C" average in the class your lesson is scheduled for.
 - c. A test or lab is being given that you cannot make up in class your lesson is scheduled for.
- 3. If you really must miss your lesson, see your lesson teacher to find out if there is another instrument group you can come with that week.
- 4. ALWAYS check the lesson schedule
- 5. ALWAYS ask your classroom teacher permission to attend your lesson. It is NOT your classroom teacher's responsibility to remember where you are going, so make sure your teacher knows.
- 6. Make sure you have made arrangements to get any notes, missed work, or homework assignments from the class you missed during your lesson. Having a band lesson does not give you carte blanche!

Required Materials

Having the right equipment can make a big difference in the success or failure of a music student. Without proper equipment a student cannot play up to his/her potential.

The following is a list of all REQUIRED accessories (as well as some optional ones) that students will need for their instruments:

All Instruments: wire music stand for home practice, metronome/tuner for home practice (device or apps)

FLUTE: cleaning rod, cleaning cloth

OBOE/BASSOON: at least 2 good, broken-in reeds, cleaning swab, cork grease

CLARINET: swab, cork grease, box of reeds (Strength 2.5 for 6th graders and Strength 3 for 7th and 8th graders), reed guards (you should rotate between at least 4 working reeds and change them every 2-3 weeks)

SAXOPHONE: neck strap, swab, cork grease, neck plug, box of reeds (Strength 2.5 for 6th graders and Strength 3 for 7th and 8th graders), reed guards (you should rotate between at least 4 working reeds) **BRASS**: Valved Brass (Trumpets, F Horns, Baritones, Tubas) -- valve oil; Trombones -- slide grease or

oil, All Brass -- tuning slide grease, cleaning snake, mouthpiece brush

PERCUSSION: bell set and snare drum or practice pad (for home use), size 5B drum sticks, yarn mallets, soft rubber mallets, T1 timpani mallets, stick bag

BOOKS: "Essential Elements 2000 Book 2" (6th Grade Students), "Sound Innovations Book 2" (Blue Band Students) -- These books are charged to students' Skyward accounts.

OPTIONAL ACCESSORIES: straight mute (brass only)

Most music stores rent less expensive models of instruments known as student models. These instruments are made to be relatively inexpensive and relatively durable. They are not necessarily made to play with the best tone quality or to stand up to many years of intense playing. Simply put, they sometimes "wear out" or musicians "grow out" of them as they gain more experience. Rather than go out and purchase an "upgraded" or "intermediate/advanced" model instrument, you can change the sound that your young musician gets (on *most* instruments), simply by changing the mouthpiece and/or reeds. You (and your student) will be surprised at the difference, and at much less of a price tag!

Optional Mouthpiece Upgrades

Clarinets: Vandoren 5rv Lyre mouthpiece, Vandoren Traditional or V12 Reeds Saxophones (alto & tenor): Selmer C-Star mouthpiece., Vandoren or Hemke Reeds

Trumpets: Bach 5C mouthpiece

Trombones/Baritones: 6.5 AL mouthpiece

Instrument Purchasing Guide

Buying a Band Instrument? ALL INSTRUMENTS ARE NOT CREATED EQUALLY! please read on...

There has been an unfortunate trend catching on in recent years involving poorly constructed and defective "off brand" instruments being sold on the internet and at well known department and wholesale stores. These instruments often look shiny and new, and they usually come with very attractive hard-shell cases. These "off-brands" typically cost much less than more well-known and reputable brands, so they seem like a good deal. When you get the instrument home it may function properly and might even sound similar to a quality brand, but this usually does not last long. Many of these brands also use nonstandard parts and can not be repaired. PLEASE CONSULT ONE OF THE BAND TEACHERS BEFORE GOING TO AN INTERNET SOURCE OR A NON-MUSIC STORE FOR A BAND INSTRUMENT! The number one priority should be getting an instrument that will function properly and will not hold back your young musician. There are numerous names that off-brands go by, so it is much easier for us to simply list brands you should look for when shopping.

Private Lessons -- Questions and Answers

- Q Why Should my child take private lessons?
- A Playing a musical instrument requires that each student learn many individualized skills. The private teacher can work one-on-one with the student and custom-tailor instruction to each child's strengths, weaknesses, and interests.
- Q Does my child have to take private lessons?
- A No, band students do not have to take private lessons to be in the band. However, as music educators it is our job to present to you, the parents, the best possible music program that can help your child grow to his/her potential. This is why we recommend that students take private lessons.
- Q Can I start my child on private lessons at a later time, after I know he/she will stay in band?
- A SURE! Most students do. However, students with private lessons early on achieve the most success because they establish great habits earlier on in their development. Students with private lessons enjoy success and are the least likely to drop band.
- Q How long should my child take private lessons?
- A Developing musicianship is an on-going process. In order to insure proper development of the student, private lessons should be a continual endeavor, meaning year-round.

- Q What can we do if we cannot afford private lessons?
- A Playing a musical instrument involves the following expenses: instrument rental, instructional materials, accessories like a music stand, reeds, etc., organizational costs like uniform fees, summer band fees, etc., private lessons. Private lessons is a way to help maximize these expenses and your child's musical potential.
- Q Will music training be of lasting value to my child?
- A Definitely yes! After the school years have passed, they can derive satisfaction from music all through life. Many adults enjoy playing in community bands at the adult level.


SCHOOL OWNED INSTRUMENTS

Some band instruments are either very expensive to purchase or rare and not always necessary for an individual to own. For this reason Westview Hills does own a limited supply of instruments that are available from the band department. These instruments include bass clarinet, tenor saxophone, baritone saxophone, baritone horn, and tuba. There are only a limited number of these instruments available, but there are usually enough to accommodate all of the students needing them. The school provides percussion instruments for the percussionists, however, those students will need a "bell kit" and drum pad for practice at home. In order to be issued a school owned instrument, the parent and student must sign the "Instrument Contract" below acknowledging that they take full responsibility for the instrument. The student is responsible for normal maintenance of his/her instrument and/or any damage to the instrument during the year. The student must provide reeds, oils, and other accessories just as students who own their own instruments would provide. No student should use anyone else's school-owned instrument except when given permission by one of the directors (this includes non-percussionists using percussion equipment). The student should keep his/her instrument in good condition at all times. Keep it clean, inside and out; valves and slides working; mouthpiece clean, etc. Keep a supply of valve or slide oil, extra reeds, swabs, and whatever else you might need available. (see Band Handbook section labeled Required Materials)
